What is a SACRE?

The Standing Advisory Council on Religious Education has several aspects to its role. It:

- Advises the local authority on matters relating to collective worship and religious education
- Advises on methods of teaching and resources for religious education
- Decides whether or not to grant determinations to those schools which apply to have daily worship which is other than of a broadly Christian character
- Identifies the need for a revised religious education syllabus

To help with this endeavour the Slough SACRE works with NASACRE (the National Association of SACREs). It has also joined with five other neighbouring SACREs to form a hub in order to undertake more significant projects than it could manage alone.

This report sets out a brief summary of the work of the Slough SACRE over the academic year 2016-2017. 
The Slough SACRE

Julie Siddiqi and Lynda Bussley continued during the first part of the academic year of this report to serve as Chair and Vice Chair respectively. Members expressed appreciation of their work and commitment. In June, at the start of the municipal year, Julie was re-elected to the role of Chair and Hardip Singh Sohal was elected as the new Vice Chair. There continues to be a disappointing number of vacancies on the SACRE and work continues to fill them.

During the year Neil Fraser left Slough Borough Council and his involvement with the SACRE as its clerk. In the few years he had this role he had developed a good understanding of the work of the SACRE and his efficiency, thoroughness and commitment were highly valued.

Members expressed thanks for the wisdom and support offered to the SACRE by Robin Croft who left the education service in Slough Borough Council during the year. They welcomed Johnny Kyriacou who took over as the officer support for the SACRE.

At the end of the year, Jo Fageant also left the SACRE. She had been at different times member, Chair and the SACRE's professional adviser since its establishment in 1998. Members thanked her for her years of service and presented her with flowers, a gift voucher and some delicious biscuits appropriately decorated to acknowledge the nature of her work.



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Three meetings were held during the year: 2 November, 14 March and 15 June. Thanks go to the Eden School and St Mary's Church for hosting these meetings. The first was held in the temporary home of the Eden Girls School. Members were welcomed by Karim Mercia, the headteacher. The school is part of the Tauheedul Trust which comprises 18 schools. Eden opened in September 2015 and is expected to grow to accommodate 800 pupils in the coming years.

In April a subcommittee was re-established to plan the work of the SACRE for the financial year 2016-2017 with the initial plan including the following elements:

- 3 termly twilight meetings for leaders of RE in primary schools
- NASACRE membership
- 2 members of the SACRE to attend the NASACRE AGM
- SACRE newsletter to be published 3 times during the year
- One sixth of the cost of the coordinated working with five other SACREs in a subsidised hub initiative focused on two main projects: Crossing the Bridges and the upcoming review of the RE syllabus.
- Cataloguing the loan collection of resources held at St Mary's Primary School.
- Preparation of the Annual SACRE report

This plan was costed and enabled regular review.

Resources

Since the closure of Slough Religious Studies Resource Centre many resources have been stored at St Mary's CE Primary School and are available for loan to other Slough schools. However, many are unaware of what the collection comprises. Work on photographing, cataloguing and publishing this information is continuing but has been delayed because the SACRE's direct contact at St Mary's has moved to another post and building work at the school has temporarily prevented access to the resources.

Members have been very grateful to Neil Fraser for his work on the website and for all his very efficient support during his time as Clerk to the SACRE.

Partnership working



The hub comprising this and five other neighbouring SACREs has continued to develop and sustain work on the Crossing the Bridges project. This is an initiative which seeks to support schools and host religious communities in developing the most educationally worthwhile visits to places of worship. A directory of places has been developed with scope for the inclusion of additional entries. There are booking and feedback forms as well as workbooks and exemplars of completed workbooks. At this address you can also read reports about the progress of the project as it developed. The hub of SACREs has been grateful to the Culham St Gabriel's and Westhill trusts for the funding they provided to support this project.

Chairs and professional advisers to the SACREs continue to meet to discuss work that is being undertaken at hub level. The next initiative, preliminary work for which has begun, is the required review of the RE syllabus. Questionnaires designed to canvas the ideas of teachers about the existing syllabus and possible future improvements were distributed to all Slough schools. In addition, during the year the hub provided training opportunities for members new to their SACRE.

The SACRE continues to be a member of the National Association of SACREs (NASACRE) to ensure members remain well informed about national debates relating to RE.

General interest

In addition to the above aspects of the SACRE's most significant work, members have been engaged in fruitful discussions about a range of topics. These have included one clarifying the entitlement of pupils and staff to take time off school to observe their religious festivals when they occur in term time. Members have also reflected on the significance of data provided for them about GCSE, AS and A level examination entries and results. They recognise that more needs to be known about the background to this data before it is

possible for them to understand the quality and provision of RE in individual schools. Members also benefit from the regular sharing of news from different faith communities in Slough about such things as celebrations and charitable endeavours which this year included *The Great Get Together*, an initiative aiming to develop good community relations in response to the murder of the MP Jo Cox. They value learning from one another about religious and cultural similarities and differences.

Collective Worship

It has not been necessary to renew any determinations during this year. A determination is permission for a school to provide daily collective worship which is not 'wholly or mainly of a broadly Christian character'. Many schools in Slough are now academies. If they need to seek a determination they now need to apply to the Education Funding Agency. Schools still need to apply to the Slough SACRE and should in the first instance contact the Clerk.
