THE BOROUGH OF SLOUGH WAITING RESTRICTIONS AND PARKING PLACES (CONSOLIDATION) ORDER 2017 (AMENDMENT No. 33) ORDER 2024 (Order 54 of 2024)

Sections 1, 45, 46 and 53 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 and Regulation 7 of the Local Authorities Traffic Orders (Procedure) (England and Wales) Regulations 1996 as amended.

1. SLOUGH BOROUGH COUNCIL gives notice that on 21st November 2024 it made an Order under sections 1, 45, 46 and 53 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 and any other enabling powers.
2. The effect of the Order is to create a new Controlled Parking Zone (CPZ) “K1” covering parts of Mill Street, parts of Petersfield Avenue, all of Benson Close and all of Whittenham Close – see the zone area plan in the supplied link. In addition, the Order also: -
 - a. Amends restrictions on Albion Close, Benson Close, Mill Street, Petersfield Avenue, St. Pauls Avenue, Stoke Road and Whittenham Close.
 - b. Creates limited waiting bays on St. Paul’s Avenue and Stoke Road.
 - c. Creates pay by phone bays on Albion Close and Petersfield Avenue.
 - d. Creates permit holders only bays partly on the footway on Petersfield Avenue.
 - e. Creates shared use permit only or limited waiting bays Monday – Saturday 8am to 7pm and permit holders only outside these hours including Sunday on Whittenham Close
3. Properties eligible for the issue of permits are set out in the Proposed Order.
4. There will be a limit of two residents permits per household for all properties listed in the schedule above, with a third permit only being issued under exceptional circumstances.
5. Each eligible property within the zone would be given an allowance of 720 visitor parking hours to purchase over a 12-month period.
6. The Order now made comes into force on 29th November 2024.
7. Copies of the Order, this notice and a statement of the Council’s reasons for making the Order may be inspected free of charge at the Council’s offices during normal working hours (excluding bank and public holidays). 8. Any person wishing to question the validity of the Order, or of any provision contained in it, on the grounds that it is not within the powers conferred by the Act, or that any requirement of the Act or of any regulations made under the Act has not been complied with may, within 6 weeks from the date on which the Order was made, apply to the High Court for this purpose.
